COURSE DESCRIPTION

In this course, advanced ESL students will focus on developing their speaking and listening skills in a variety of contexts. They will learn such listening strategies as listening for main ideas and details, predicting content, dealing with distractions, and using context clues to understand what they hear. They will also improve their pronunciation. Students will participate in a variety of activities designed to improve their confidence in speaking.

PREREQUISITES

Canadian Language Benchmark (CLB) score of 6 in listening and speaking.

EQUIVALENCY OR TRANSFERABILITY

This course is not articulated, therefore may not be used as a transferable credit.

COURSE FORMAT

This class will use a variety of delivery methods from lecture to group work to paired work. As this class aims to improve listening skills it will rely on a variety of sources such as audio files, guest speakers and videos. Students should expect to spend 4-6 hours per week on homework, group work, and assignments.

ASSESSMENTS

Participation and in-class activities (10%)

Students will be graded on overall attendance and participation. Participation is vital as the success of the course is almost entirely dependent upon student engagement. Those students who are involved in the activities make the learning experience more beneficial for everyone. There will also be some activities to help prepare for the larger assignments.

Major Assignments (60%)

Students will complete 4 major assignments, one at the end of each unit. Some of which will be completed in pairs or small groups.

Listening/Note-taking Quizzes (20%)

There will be listening quizzes with comprehension questions. They will focus on the student's ability to take effective notes, identifying the general ideas and specific details. There will also be a pronunciation component to one of these quizzes.

Final Exam (10%)

Students will be tested on a range of listening and note-taking strategies studied throughout the course.
