COURSE DESCRIPTION

Physics 101 is a calculus-based first-year university level physics course intended for students planning on a career in the physical sciences or engineering. Topics covered are: vectors, linear kinematics, and dynamics in 2- and 3- dimensions; centre of mass; rotational kinematics and dynamics; energy and work; and temperature, heat and the first law of thermodynamics. Labs involve quantitative physics experiments with due recognition of systematic and random errors.

Physics 101 and Physics 102 together constitute a full course and satisfy requirements for 6 credits of first-year physics in the science degree programs at most Canadian universities.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Physics 12 or PHYSICS 060 or PHYSICS 100

Math 100 is co-requisite.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon successful completion of the course, students will:

- Have an understanding of fundamental concepts of classical physics.
- Have developed critical thinking skills.
- Have developed basic laboratory skills.

COURSE FORMAT

Weekly breakdown of instructional hours

Lectures: 4 hours per week (3h lecture + 1h tutorial)

Labs: 3 hours per week

Classes are a blend of lecture and tutorial allowing for an opportunity to practice solving calculation-based problems related to the material being covered in class. <u>Students with a sound physics background can expect to spend between two and four hours in preparation and study for every hour spent in class.</u>

Labs are a mandatory component of the course. In order to receive a passing grade in the lab, a student must complete the experiments and submit the required reports. If a lab period is missed, the report for that experiment cannot be submitted unless arrangements are made with the instructor. Expectations for the labs are outlined in the lab manual.

Delivery format

In-person

Material will be posted on Moodle, including lecture notes, assignments, course announcements, suggested textbook problems, and other useful or interesting material related to the course.

Pre-Lecture Quizzes (5%)

There will be around ten quizzes during the term, worth a total of 5% of the final grade. The quizzes will be based on pre-lecture reading assignments. Missed quizzes cannot be made up, but the lowest quiz result will be discarded.

Assignments (10%)

There will be seven assignments due during the term, worth a total of 10% of the final grade. Unless prior arrangements have been made with the instructor, late assignments will not be accepted and will thus receive a mark of 0.

Midterm Test (25%)

There will be one midterm test held during the term, worth 25% of the final grade.

Final Examination (30%)

The final examination will cover the entire course and is worth 30% of the final grade. It will be held at the end of the term during the exam period. A minimum mark of 50% on the final exam is required in order to pass the course.

Laboratory (30%)

The laboratory component is worth 30% of the final grade. This will be based on lab performance and lab reports. The specific evaluation criteria for the lab are detailed in the lab manual.
